Vida Heydari Contemporary is pleased to present works by Aparajita Jain Mahajan, Debasree Das, Deepika Sakhat, Demos Chiang, Harisha Chennangod, Kanan Koteshwar, Monali Meher, M. Pravat, Reza Derakshani, Samim Alam Beg, and Yashna Kaul in its debut presentation at Art Mumbai, reflecting on what it means to belong, observe, and shape the spaces we call "home." Together, these artists present a conversation around home—not merely as a physical space, but as an evolving idea shaped by memory, time, and the ever-changing landscapes of our lives.

In his works M. Pravat engages deeply with urbanization, examining the continual expansion of cities and the homes within them. His works explore the tension between creation and destruction, reflecting on how our urban environments are constantly built, deconstructed, and rebuilt. In contrast, Monali Meher approaches home through the lens of time and movement, especially within the context of migration and transience. Her performances and object-based works, often wrapped and rewrapped, echo the passage of time and the ephemeral nature of belonging.

Aparajita Jain Mahajan examines care and hope through her intimate mixed-media works using inherited threads and materials. Her works reflect home as a space of mending and repairing, whether of material or emotional connections. Debasree Das steps beyond the confines of home, looking outward at society. Her narrative-driven mixed media paintings combine the personal and political, offering an intimate portrayal of the world as she seeks moments of hope and joy amidst societal challenges. Harisha Chennangod constructs layered abstract works with repetitive patterns that evoke a meditative rhythm, drawing from rural landscapes and memories to depict home as a contemplative and spiritual space.

Kanan Koteshwar delves into preservation and memory, weaving her museological background into delicate embroidered works that celebrate the impermanence and revival of forgotten histories, whereas Samim Alam Beg explores the materiality of home through sculptures that intertwine architecture and organic forms, highlighting the coexistence of decay and resilience. Yashna Kaul reflects on home through photography, using family albums to explore the delicate balance between memory and forgetting, especially in relation to personal and collective histories.

Demos Chiang uses animals as metaphors for resilience, often celebrating their presence and perseverance in the face of human encroachment. His mixed-media works offer a poetic reflection on life's transience, emphasizing the fragility of ecosystems. Similarly, Deepika Sakhat finds solace in the natural world, capturing the freedom of birds and landscapes in her work, offering a meditative escape from the urban intensity that shapes her perception of home. Finally, Reza Derakshani continues to blend abstraction and figuration, exploring themes of exile, alienation, and the natural world. His rich, layered canvases present a complex dialogue between cultural identity, home, and the universal quest for belonging.

These eleven contemporary artists together present works that transcend geographical boundaries, delving into the intersection of personal history, material memory, and the ever-evolving contemporary landscape, thereby rendering a deep exploration of what it means to inhabit, observe, and be shaped by the idea of home.

APARAJITA JAIN MAHAJAN

Employing repetitive mark-making, Aparajita Jain Mahajan's mixed-media works present tactile and reflective spaces for an observer to connect with, feel, and respond to the intricacies of the outer and inner worlds. Rooted in memories, intuitive daily moments, and the intricate organic world, fragment-like experiential forms create emotive topographies on handmade paper within her work, depicted through meticulous acts of stitching and drawing. Growing from a flat surface to become three-dimensional, the works often incorporate scraps from her late mother's textile apparel practice. While the works' map-like spaces are discovered through traces of footprints and legacies, a passage of time is evoked as memories are seen within changing contexts.

DEBASREE DAS

Debasree Das's artistic practice encompasses drawing, painting, hand embroidery, and appliqué on materials such as silk, canvas, and paper. Her mixed media paintings serve as cathartic expressions, offering a release from sorrow and pain. Debasree's works are often narrative-driven, with a focus on the self, but her recent work shifts the spotlight to the world around her, portraying how she perceives the struggles and triumphs of life. She explores the inner emotions of all living forms, emphasizing that every being, has the right to express themselves, to grow, and to be nurtured. Her works celebrate this freedom, portraying it as a universal force that connects all forms of life, each with its own unique voice, story, and potential to blossom.

In her recent body of work, Debasree Das responds to the unsettling events of our time by transforming her works into a vessel for hope and optimism. Through her vibrant compositions, she envisions a moment of triumphant celebration following a prolonged and arduous struggle.





DEEPIKA SAKHAT

Deepika Sakhat's works on paper are shaped by her desire to find balance against the intense demands of city life, with its constant hum and exhausting pace, leading her to seek solace in the nature. Open landscapes, towering mountains, rural simplicity, untamed wilderness, the freedom of birds, and the timeless cycles of the sun and moon evoke for her a sense of enlightenment, grandeur, and freedom. These elements, which she sees as fundamental to the richness of life, have sparked in her a deep philosophical understanding of the earth's ecosystem—a personal discovery that informs her work.

In this body of work, Deepika explores birds as symbols of nature itself, capturing their journeys through movement and spontaneity. Observing birds—their swift actions, delicate expressions, and the energy of their flight—offers her an authentic glimpse into their worlds. Their songs, cutting through the noise of the city, inspire her to express their vibrant spirit and to merge these observations with human emotions and experiences. This reconnection with nature and her mindful observation of it have provided healing and insight throughout her artistic journey, allowing her to depict her own freedom of thought, understanding, and appreciation of the natural world in a deeply personal way. Her works thus become self-portraits, reflecting a quiet yet profound dialogue with her surroundings.





DEMOS CHIANG

Across the various formats and diverse mediums he employs, Chiang's artistic practice is an echo of his personal experiences – where the East and the West find themselves in a continuous dialogue with each other. As an artist, he strives to visualise the fragments of his life and process them by recomposing these fragment-like realities through his artworks.

In this set of paintings, Chiang retains blanks, gaps, and imperfections, leaving behind an open composition that invites viewers to amalgamate their own experiences with the works, in order to complete the work.

Moreover, animals often populate and become protagonists of his paintings, personifying values of honesty and simplicity. Chiang finds the eyes of the animals particularly arresting, since they mirror an inner-being that neither intends to hide its desires nor has calculative intentions at heart.

The paintings by Chiang are therefore envisioned to act as reminders for human beings (who share many affinities with animals) to inculcate a sincere view towards life, where the need of a being to curb its desires—often deemed excessive—is reworked.



HARISHA CHENNANGOD


Harisha Chennangod's artworks transcend the present, intertwining layers of memories. Repetition takes on a central role in Harisha's abstract paintings. Mundane sights are portrayed with mesmerising familiarity, yet each viewing yields something new with a transformative experience. The colours dance, captivating viewers with their allure. This enchantment is echoed in rural landscapes as well. The repeating pattern of Harisha's paintings reflect all this and more; armatures of construction, patterns and forms from surrounding observation, lines overlap layer by layer, geometric shapes, and colour-blocks create congestion inside the grids, the space in between, the relation of colours, and the notion of forms are equally important.


Chennangod's visual language portrays the unfolding of life, consciously or unconsciously, without organic forms. He constructs minimal lines and forms on the canvas, allowing his unconscious observations to subtly shape his works. The illusion of overlapping threads on a loom is evoked by his lines, which converge, and fray at the margins, revealing the quiet periphery. Describing the meditative quality of his works, eminent artist Vasudevan Akkitham notes, "the weaving and layering in Harisha's works have a number of meanings like in Kabir's poems- they are marked by repetition which is both spiritual and therapeutic."

In his works, therefore, spaces, lines, shapes, and colours collaborate to create a meditative process for Harisha. Through this practice, he observes and reveals the refined nuances of life. The process itself is paramount, as each layer responds to the previous one, resulting in a new image with each painting.

KANAN KOTESHWAR

Kanan Koteshwar's artistic practice is deeply influenced by her background in museology, where she perceives a poetic irony in the preservation of what has seemingly lost its significance. She likens this process to finding life within the dead—an act of reforming the broken and forgotten. Through this lens, she taps into a predominantly feminine space of nurturing, where her role as an artist becomes that of a caregiver, bringing new meaning to the mundane.

Her approach to art is intuitive and experimental, engaging with different materials and mediums. Rather than imposing meaning onto her work, she allows the material to guide her, coaxing out its inherent significance. Her artistic interventions are intentionally subtle and minimal, with a focus on organic processes. Koteshwar's mastery of embroidery plays a key role in this practice, seamlessly merging with the materials she works with, particularly paper, for a tactile experience. Through her delicate use of embroidery and paper, she crafts pieces that are as much about revitalization as they are about the beauty of impermanence.

M. PRAVAT

As a multidisciplinary artist, M. Pravat has long been driven by the dissonance between the city as it exists in masterplans, as it is idealized in popular imagination, and as it is physically experienced. This discord, which is encountered with brutal intensity in everyday life, has been a central theme in Pravat's practice. Whether it is the intimacy of our homes or the sweeping scale of urban development and the creation of "smart cities," this tension permeates the lived experiences that Pravat seeks to explore. In recent years, his focus has shifted toward the processes of deconstruction—not just of the urban landscape, but also of habitats, materials, and even images themselves.


M. Pravat is increasingly drawn to the idea that at the heart of any construction lies a systematic process of undoing and destruction. This paradox is central to Pravat's current work: how can one critically engage with and express the forces of both creation and destruction simultaneously? In his most recent body of work Pravat attempts to find visual forms and conceptual answers to this question. In this series, he explores the tangible impact of urban development on homes, infrastructures, cities, and, ultimately, the planet. Through the lens, Pravat aims to capture the cyclical nature of construction and deconstruction, the rise from debris that is both literal and metaphorical.







MONALI MEHER

Monali Meher's artistic practice is deeply anchored in the concept of time, which serves as both a medium and a central theme in her work. Whether through her wrapped objects or her performances, time is extended, assembled, and captured, reflecting the cyclical nature of destruction and renewal. Her atmospheric and ritualistic performances traverse disciplines, embodying themes of decay, transformation, and hybridization.

Meher's work engages with notions of identity, reshaping belongings, and exploring intimacy. It weaves together matter and memory in a dialogue that forms the core of her artistic language. Continuity, repetition, and vulnerability are recurring motifs, while duration, temporality, and public engagement are inherent to her process. Her work invites viewers to experience time in its many dimensions—evoking a sense of both impermanence and regeneration.





REZA DERAKSHANI

Drawing from his early life in the Iranian countryside, where the colours of the landscape and the poetry of Persian culture left an indelible mark, Derakshani's practice embodies a unique blend of Persian heritage and modern aesthetics. His paintings are often characterized by rich textures, vibrant colours, and intricate compositions, reflecting his deep connection to themes of nature, spirituality, and the cultural memory of Iran. Derakshani's art is profoundly influenced by Persian miniatures, calligraphy, and poetry, which he reinterprets through a contemporary lens. His series on gardens, night skies, and hunting scenes draw on classical motifs but are layered with abstraction, engaging in a dialogue between the past and the present. His works often evoke themes of beauty, loss, and resilience, resonating with the complexities of Iranian history and culture. The tension between elegance and rawness, light and darkness, speaks to Derakshani's exploration of life's dualities and his own journey between East and West.







SAMIM ALAM BEG

Samim Alam Beg's artistic practice explores the complex connections between architecture, nature, and the materials that unite them. Initially focused on the micro-details of natural forms—textures, patterns, and organic shapes—his work has expanded to encompass broader landscapes and architectural ruins. Beg views ruins not merely as markers of decay, but as living vessels of history, transformation, and form, linking past narratives to the present. These structures embody the inherent tension between permanence and transience, sparking a dialogue that fuels his creative process.

Material exploration lies at the heart of Beg's practice. Working with ceramics, metal, and other evocative materials, he creates abstract, meticulous sculptures that bridge the rigid lines of architecture with the organic, irregular forms found in nature and ruins. He uses photography as a documentary tool as well as a medium of artistic expression. This interplay between photography and sculpture creates a layered narrative, highlighting the fragility of nature, the solidity of built forms, and the gradual decay that touches both. By abstracting natural forms and coalescing them with architectural logic, he offers a fresh way to see these realms, instigating a renewed appreciation for their interconnected beauty and resilience.





YASHNA KAUL

Yashna Kaul is a photographer whose practice extends beyond the traditional boundaries of the medium, delving into the complex interplay between photography, memory, and the construction of personal and collective narratives. Her work, deeply introspective yet universally resonant, engages with the family album as a site of inquiry—a space where memories are both preserved and constructed, where the act of remembering is inextricably linked to the potential for forgetting. At the heart of Kaul's artistic exploration is the notion that photography, often seen as a tool for preserving moments, is equally implicated in the processes of erasure and omission. A photograph, in its claim to capture and materialize memory, suggests that without its intervention, certain moments might fade into oblivion. This duality—the simultaneous presence and absence of memory—forms the crux of Kaul's work, where she probes the limits of what photography can hold and what it might inevitably leave behind.

Kaul's ongoing project engages with her personal history, particularly her father's struggle with early-onset Alzheimer's disease, which has profoundly affected his memory and, by extension, her own relationship to the past. As she navigates her father's neurological decline, she turns to the family album, not just as a repository of memories but as a tool for re-examining and reinterpreting the familial narrative. Through her lens, the album becomes a space where memory is contested and where the truth of the past is continually reconstructed.

MONALI MEHER

Monali Meher, born in 1969 in Pune, India, is a multidisciplinary artist who studied at the Sir J. J. School of Art, Mumbai. Her career has spanned several decades, during which she has performed and exhibited at prominent international venues such as Tate Modern, Sinop Biennale in Turkey, Rijksmuseum Twenthe, Art Dubai, MAXXI Museum Rome, Guangzhou Live in China, and the Prague Biennale. Her work has been featured in renowned institutions including the Cobra Museum in Amstelveen, Museum Arnhem, and Stedelijk Kunstakademie.

Notable highlights in Meher's career include receiving the prestigious 'Golden Chimera Award' at the ICASTICA Biennial in Arezzo, Italy, in 2013, and her participation in major events such as the 4th Thessaloniki Biennale, the Dakar Biennale, and the Kathmandu Triennale. In 2021, her performance at Arctic Action VI in Spitsbergen and her inclusion in the 'Upcycling' Sinop Biennale 8 exemplify her ongoing engagement with global audiences.

Meher's practice explores themes of time, memory, and transformation, often through performance and site-specific installations. REZA DERAKSHANI

Reza Derakshani was born in 1952 in Sangsar, Iran. He pursued his education at the Faculty of Fine Arts, University of Tehran, under the guidance of prominent figures like Hannibal Alkhas, Marcos Grigorian, and Mohsen Vaziri Moghaddam. Later, he pursued further education at the Pasadena Art School in California. After teaching at the University of Tehran for several years, Derakshani embarked on a period of artistic exploration in the U.S. and Europe, where his work evolved to integrate Iranian artistic heritage with the influences of Neo-Expressionism and Western abstract movements. His work, often described as a modern extension of Persian miniature painting (Negargari), melds intricate symbolism with dynamic, large-scale compositions that are celebrated for their vibrant color and radiant surfaces, incorporating materials such as silver and gold leaf.

Derakshani's artistic journey began early, with his first solo exhibitions in the early 1970s at the Ghandriz and Seyhoun Galleries in Tehran, gaining him swift recognition. Throughout the 2000s, Derakshani continued to exhibit widely, with notable solo exhibitions such as "Beyond the Darkness" at Khak Art Gallery in Tehran, and "Migration" at Leila Heller Gallery, New York. His work has also been featured in the 6th Tehran Contemporary Painting Biennial, held at the Tehran Museum of Contemporary Art.




